

## **Bring on the World**

### **Day 5 Afternoon session: Five-a-side football competition or presentation of project work**

#### **EITHER**

#### **Activity 1: Five-a-side football competition**

**Time required: 2 hours**

#### **You will need**

- Footballs
- Bibs or bands
- Cones
- Extra adults or pupils who can act as umpires, a scorer and a timekeeper.

#### **Aims**

- To enable pupils to participate in a five-a-side football competition.
- To reinforce positive encouragement between pupils.
- To give opportunities for pupils to co-operate with their fellow team members.
- To foster empathy for others.

#### **What to do**

Set up a tournament so that five-a-side teams can play against one another. See the information sheet Running a five-a-side tournament (see page 3) for further information.

After the competition (which should last about an hour-and-a-half) all teams should congratulate the winning team. Then all teams should be encouraged to congratulate/commiserate appropriately, showing empathy for how pupils in other teams might be feeling. Have any pupils changed their opinion on this morning's debate, 'Competition should be banned'? If so, why?

## Running a five-a-side tournament

### Tournament based on 6 teams of 5

Before the tournament starts, it is important to remind pupils about the importance of encouraging fellow team members and of keeping comments to one another positive not negative. Point out that positive comments boost confidence and therefore performance. Criticism has the opposite effect.

### First-round matches

There are six teams, A to F (which can be renamed as desired). First-round matches last 5 minutes each. Three matches are played at a time.
